

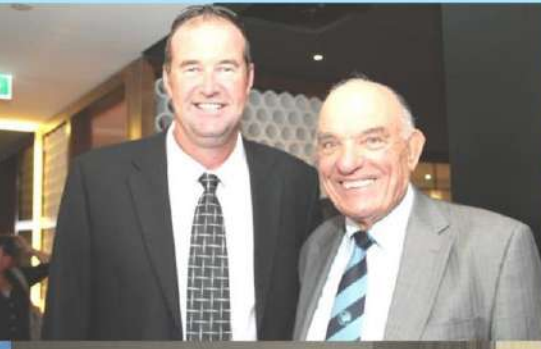

Chair's Report

Your Club remains strong with good playing performances in Men's, Women's and Academy teams, and a strong pipeline of male and female juniors coming through. We are fortunate to be based in Parramatta, Cumberland, and the Hills areas, where the passion for cricket is strong and growing.

We are in a sound financial position, though our JAYCAR sponsorship is at an end, and will need to be replaced. We thank the late Gary Johnson and JAYCAR for a decade of invaluable support.

What a crazy season it was once again. Another shortened season! Late start due to Covid, almost entirely One Day Limited Over & T20 format, frequent changes of playing conditions to cope with COVID issues, and just when we thought things were getting back to normal, extreme wet weather conditions for weeks on end brought numerous washouts and an early end for most!

Hanging over us all was the shadow of Ron Wright OAM, who passed suddenly just prior to the season. Much more about Ron to come.

Making the most of the conditions, and women's second grade won their third premiership, declared Premiers after an unfortunate washout in the final. Our men's fourth grade, won the minor premiership, following an outstandingly consistent season. But with most of the last premiership rounds washed out completely, the QF and the SF both washed out, the boys finished second in a final unexpectedly actually played, but missing out on the premiership so richly deserved.

Finishing 10th in the men's Club Championship probably reflects our season fairly, with a few near misses with opposition 9 down, opportunities lost, so close to a stronger finish.

Individually, some wonderful performances. Sean Abbott continues to perform at the highest level, unfortunately being injured when Test selection appeared imminent, but still selected in the Australian T20 and 50 over squads.

Ryan Hadley and Claire Moore made New South Wales debuts.

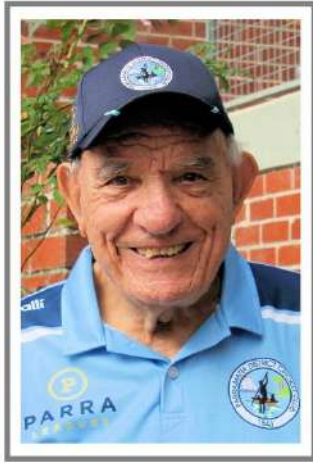
Tim Ward having moved to Tasmania won the Bradman Young Cricketer of the Year! Hayley Silver-Holmes now settled in Tasmania was not so lucky, with injury limiting her season. Nevertheless a promising first-class career awaits.

Many young men and women were selected in New South Wales development squads. The pipeline of representative players coming out of Parramatta for New South Wales is strong and growing.

Lucy Wilson won both the Brewer Shield Player of the Year and 3rd grade Player of the Year. Kate Powell earned selection in the Kingsgrove first grade women's team of the year as wicket keeper.



Luke Dempsey's record-breaking innings of 105 included an eye-watering 13 sixes and 3 fours. Demo now ranks 7th in the all-time records for sixes hit in a men's first grade innings, behind Test Players Victor Trumper (twice) in the 1902/3 and 1904/5 and Tibby Cotter 1906, and more recently Shane Watson.



The loss of Ron Wright was keenly felt. Ron had been club Secretary for over 40 years almost unbroken. Over the years Ron became an ever-present, almost grandfatherly figure to all the players and officials. The “Do Ron”.

Ron was on every committee, involved in everything. He wanted to be part of every part of the club and contributing to every activity. This he did, better and better, over the many years, almost a quarter of this mighty Club’s history. In the club’s darkest days in the early 2000s, Harold Goodwin often said the club would have folded if not for Ron’s physical and financial support. With the help of his intrepid assistant Roslyn in his office at Surgical Specialists, Ron and Roslyn provided all the administrative support.

Roslyn was an unsung hero; we owe her a great Debt of gratitude also!

The Club held a lovely tribute wake at Ron’s spiritual home, Old Kings Oval in December, once COVID restrictions were eased enough to allow. About 150 family members, current and past players, supporters and officials attended.

More about Ron later in this report.

Changes to procedures skilfully implemented, and great volunteers helped cover the situation. Special mention to Peter Garlick who expanded his role as First Grade scorer including scoring live on MyCricket, to become Registrar, electronic scoreboard wizard, MyCricket manager, statistician, and “Frogbox” live streaming organiser and also scored for the PG’s, A.W. Green Shield, Third Grade Qualifying Final and 4th Grade Final.

Sumindre Gunawardane who took over Webmaster duties and did a great job. Tom Wood and Rod Cherry who covered the canteen, Jason Coleman and Paul Giumelli who ran the Men’s Cricket program, in fact the whole Men’s and Women’s Directors and volunteers who stepped up to fill the void.

Moving to online registrations, with online payments driven by Treasurer Mohan has been a big efficiency, with no more cash to be counted, recorded, and banked. Mohan linked payments to our new modern Xero accounting system which streamlined a lot of back-office work. Peter West has done a tremendous job organising all our events including the Ron Wright Tribute Day with the help of the Organising Committee.

At time of writing, we are seeking a new Secretary for what is now a much more defined and smaller role and hope to fill that position for the new season.

In addition to the loss of Ron, we lost major sponsor Gary Johnston, owner/founder of JAYCAR, our sponsor for the last decade. Gary passed unexpectedly in 2021. Gary’s great support has been much appreciated and his loss will be deeply felt.



Finally, our great supporter Joan Anderson-Jones passed away not long after her 100th birthday. Joan was wife of 1970s Club Secretary and Life Member Bill Anderson, mother of life member Bob Anderson, and a great contributor to the club as a volunteer in her own right, running fundraising fashion parades and other events.

The club gave her especially embroidered Two Blues cap with 100 on it. Her smiling face sadly missed.

On a brighter note, two noted past players also turned 100, Alan Cramond long time player in the 1950s and 60s, and Eric Tweedale better known for his Test rugby exploits, but who played for Cumberland in the 1940s.

John Benaud organised best wishes from many past players for Alan, and Tom Wood arranged another embroidered Two Blues cap to celebrate.



Post the season, Queens Birthday Honours were announced, and our very own Doug Walters was awarded richly deserved Australian Honours, an AM to go with his British MBE - our hearty congratulations to Doug!

At time of writing, we are still working on developing Richie Benaud Oval as a Premier Grade Cricket oval with Sporting Hall of Fame. Council’s current estimate is that this will be a \$20 million project!

New Federal Member for Parramatta Andrew Charlton has committed \$6.2 million to cover stage one – the playing surface. We are currently working with Council to complete an application for a New South Wales State Government Grant to cover the project in total. If completed according to plans it will be a fabulous facility for Cricket, and recognition of Richie Benaud’s roots as a Parramatta boy. We thank new Lord Mayor Donna Davis and Deputy Lord Mayor Sameer Pandey for their great support, along with previous Lord Mayor Bob Dwyer who really kick started this fabulous initiative.

At this point in time, our club does not have the required three cricket ovals on which to play. Since Coleman Oval in Parramatta Park went out of commission many years ago, the Club has been able to borrow firstly Mona Park No. 3 (now Mike Wood Oval), and more recently Castlewood in the Hills District. We thank Auburn CC and North West Sydney Hurricanes for their support over many years to help fill this gap. However Hills Council has advised that will no longer occur.

The development of Richie Benaud Oval is desperately needed to cover current needs and the growing needs of cricket in the fast growing cricket loving population of the greater Parramatta district..

In closing, your club is in fine shape. We have a consistently strong Men’s program, strong and growing Women’s program, and vibrant Academy.

We look forward to consistent success in coming seasons.

Parramatta District Cricket Club – Birthdays to Celebrate

(By Tom Wood – Club Historian)

Two former Parramatta (Cumberland) players have or are about to achieve incredible ‘Life Milestones’ -

- **Alan Cramond** –turned 100 years of age on the 20th May 2022
- **Eric Tweedale** – turned 101 years of age on the 5th May 2022.

Alan Cramond



Alan’s career with Central Cumberland stretched between **1946/47** and **1968/69**. During his time with Cumberland Alan played plenty of 2nd grade, but it was in the 3rd grade arena that he left a lasting legacy as a captain and player.

He never got to represent Cumberland in 1st grade, but before World War II he ventured out of NSW Country cricket as an 18-year-old tearaway fast bowler and played 1st grade with the Western Suburbs club.

The crafty off-spinner and capable hard-hitting batsman’s playing statistics **all grades** for the club he claimed **612 wickets @ 18.13** and scored **4,691 runs @ 16.58** (H.S. - 94)

He captained the Cumberland 3rd grade team between 1952/53 and 1968/69 (including **Premiership** victories in 1959/60 and 1964/65).

In 3rd grade he remains the club’s most successful all-rounder: **3,197 runs @ 18.27** and **425 wickets @ 17.05**. His best season with the bat was in 1953/54 when he compiled 439 runs @ 27.44 (H.S. 64), and as a bowler his most prolific years were 1949/50 – **47 wickets @ 14.34**, 1964/65 – **42 wickets @ 13.19** and 1967/68 – **42 wickets @ 13.95**. He wasn’t able to score a century but got close with **94** v. Glebe in 1960/61.

His statistics in the other grades were 2nd grade 1,081 runs @ 13.02 (best – 66) and 124 wickets @ 22.13 – 4th grade 413 runs @ 16.52 and 63 wickets @ 17.54, in all grades he held 61 catches.

Alan Cramond holds the rare distinction of being elected a **Life Member** of **two** Sydney Grade Clubs, firstly the Parramatta District Cricket Club, and later the Sutherland District Cricket Club where he was a long-term Club President.

Eric Tweedale

Eric Tweedale is renowned as the oldest living ex-Wallaby Rugby Union Test player. The rugged prop forward from the Parramatta Rugby Union Club played 10 Tests for Australia between 1946 and 1949.



The versatile and talented sportsman also played Grade cricket for Central Cumberland prior to going off to fight in World War II. A left-arm fast-medium swing bowler he enjoyed considerable in the 1940/41 season, particularly in 2nd grade where he captured **46 wickets @ 13.17**, and in Poidevin-Gray he snared **11 wickets @ 16.72** (including **7/81** v. Balmain).

The above performances led to him debuting in 1st grade during that season – 1st Player Number **268**. After the War Eric made a cameo visit to Cumberland’s 1st grade team in the 1945/46 season, but by then his footballing star was on the rise and he was lost to cricket.



“From the Past”

Parramatta (Central Cumberland) District Cricket Club

- On Saturday 14th February 2022 in a NSW Premier Cricket 1st grade 50 over match against the Blacktown Mounties, **Luke Dempsey** took center stage and lived up to his nickname of the ‘Big Ticket.’ Chasing Blacktown’s total of 9/189 his Parramatta team was *‘teetering on the brink’* at 3/54 when he took to the crease to join captain Nick Bertus in a rescue mission. The robust, bearded Dempsey then proceeded to *‘unleash the monster’* pulverizing the defenseless Blacktown bowling attack in a display of merciless power-hitting seldom seen in Premier cricket. Even the motor vehicles residing in the Old Kings Oval carpark were ducking for cover as “Demo” smote an amazing **13 x 6s** and 3 x 4s on his way to carving out a stunning **105 runs** of just **45 balls**, along the way combining with Bertus in a match-winning 4th wicket partnership of 133 runs. In one over he smashed 31 runs (5 x 6, and 1).

It was the second occasion in which I was fortunate enough to witness Luke Dempsey in a prolonged assault mode – the first being a 2nd grade 50 over match in the 2018/19 season:



Dempsey Destroys Mosman

- Those present at last Saturday’s (Australia Day 2019) 2nd grade Premier Cricket 50 over match at Old Kings Oval, between home team Parramatta and the visiting Mosman Whales, were treated to a brilliant batting assault by Parra’s burly all-rounder **Luke “Demolition” Dempsey**. The ferocious hitting Dempsey well and truly harpooned the hapless Whales blasting their bowling attack into submission with a dynamic **155 runs off just 87 balls** – generated by a crowd-pleasing **7 x 6s** and **18 x4 s** – it was a performance of supreme raw power. Demo then backed up to help Parramatta to victory by *‘winkling out’* **3/40** with his cagey medium-pacers.
- Dempsey now holds the record for the most sixes hit in one innings by a Parramatta batsman in NSW Premier 1st grade Cricket. The list of Parra’s top maximum-hitters is shown below, with the equally devastating Ben Abbott featuring prominently:

- **13** – Luke Dempsey v. Blacktown Mounties (2021/22)
 - 11 – Ben Abbott v. Bankstown (T20) (2019/20)
 - 10 – Ben Abbott v. Gordon (2019/20)
 - 9 – George H. Payne v. Balmain (1906/07)
 - 8 – Edgar Lloyd Waddy v. Waverley (1913/14)
 - 8 – Ben Abbott v. Western Suburbs (T20) (2020/21)
 - 7 – Edgar Lloyd Waddy v. Waverley (1912/13)
 - 7 – Damian Wallace v. St. George (2003/04)
 - 7 – Ben Abbott v. Sydney University (T20) (2019/20)
 - 7 – Luke Dempsey v. Mosman (2019/20)
- Continuing the theme of big-hitting, over the years Parramatta batsmen have wreaked havoc on opposing bowlers and some of heaviest punishment dished out in a single over is highlighted below:
- **34** (8 ball over – 4, 6, 6, 4, 6, 2, 6) by **Harold ‘Mudgee’ Cranney** against North Sydney’s State medium-pacer A.J. Hopkins at Parramatta Oval in **1920/21**. First Grade.
 - **31** (6 ball over – 6, 6, 6, 6, 6, 1) by **Luke Dempsey** against Blacktown at Old Kings Oval **2021/22**. First Grade.
 - **30** (6 ball over) – Fast bowling all-rounder **Adam Denmeade** took the ‘long handle’ to St. George off-spinner Brendan Hill in the 50th over of a one-day match at Merrylands Oval in 2003/04. First Grade.
 - **34** (6 ball over) – Whilst recovering from an injury **Adam Denmeade** played in a **5th Grade** match at Coleman Oval in 1998/99, and officially was accredited with 34 runs (6, 6, 6, 6, 6, 4) in the scorebook. However, all the Parramatta players (including veteran skipper Johnny Aitken) were adamant the umpire erred and that the last ball was in fact yet another 6.
- For all-rounders the ‘ultimate match’ is one in which they achieve the **golden double** of five wickets in an innings combined with the scoring of a century. Several Parramatta players have produced this performance in 1st Grade over the years – the list includes some of the most elite players to have turned out for the ‘two-blues’:
- **244** and **9/40** – Les Pye v. Leichhardt-Balmain in 1898/99.
 - 121 and 7/75 – Les Pye v. Paddington in 1901/02.
 - 150* and 5/75 – Les Pye v. North Sydney in 1902/03.
 - 154 and 5/87 – Harold ‘Mudgee’ Cranney v. Waverley in 1910/11.
 - 126 and 5/62 – Richie Benaud v. Northern Districts in 1962/63.
 - 131 and 5/52 – Doug Walters v. Randwick in 1965/66.
 - 100* and 5/18 – Doug Walters v. North Sydney in 1979/80.

Near misses on achieving this feat were:

Les Pye –

- 108 and 4/48 v. Leichhardt-Balmain in 1902/03.
- 115 and 4/76 v. Burwood in 1904/05.
- 168* and 4/73 v. Middle-Harbour in 1906/07.
- 108* and 4/93 v. Middle-Harbour in 1911/12.

Richie Benaud –

- 104 and 4/79 v. Gordon in 1954/55.
- 93 and 7/57 v. North Sydney in 1956/57.
- 90 and 5/52 v. Sydney University in 1958/59.

- Parramatta being a club with a long and enduring history, it is always interesting to delve back into that rich pod of stories and highlight some of the club's matches those days gone by:
 - **1913/14** - History was made during a First Grade match against the Petersham club at the Sydney Cricket Ground. Cumberland's tall, loose limbed left-arm orthodox spinner **Rupert Coogan** went on a record-breaking rampage. Batting first Petersham '*battled hard*' against the naggingly accurate spin of Coogan but managed to compile an ultimate match determining **195**. Coogan efforts yielded him **6/71** (off 23 overs), he received staunch support from R.B. Strange (2/34) and Les Best (2/30) – these bowlers were backed by Les Pye who pocketed 3 catches and Sid Thomas who's brilliant fielding was reported as a feature of Cumberland's out cricket. In reply the 'Cumbo's' crashed to be all out for **121** with only Stan Thomas (21) and his brother Sid (21), and Pye (20) posting any resistance. In their second dig the 'Petes' crumbled for a mere 105, destroyed by the skill and guile of Coogan who captured **9/63** – thus setting a still standing club record for the most wickets in a match in First grade (**15/134**) – R.B. Strange (0/42) bowled unchanged at the other end. Needing 180 runs to win outright Cumberland were in strong pursuit at 3/111 when time run out. Coogan also set the Club's record for the most wickets in a First grade season of **56** in 1913/14 – that record is now jointly-shared with Jack Treanor and Billy Lothian.
 - **1923/24** – A standout performance for the Cumberland First grade, in an otherwise bleak season, was their enthralling victory over Petersham. The 'Petes' took first use of the wicket and batted stoutly to rattle up a daunting **292**. The Cumberland response floundered on the rocks from the beginning, at one stage the 'two-blues' were reeling at 3/23 (star batsman E.K. Brown absent on rep duty), however they managed to scramble to **7/151**. At that point with only two wickets left, and one of them the complete batting bunny Rupert Coogan the men from Parramatta looked dead meat. Then up stepped Fred Brett to join the established Fred Wright to stage a sterling fight-back that projected the Cumbos score to **244**, before Brett was ruled to be runout in what was a highly disputed umpiring decision. Things looked forlorn with victory 48 runs away when the last hope R.C. Coogan walked to the crease, but with a display of true grit and an once or two of luck, the last ditch pair '*pulled the match out of the fire*' and steered Cumberland to a 15 run win. **Fred Wright** was the hero of the day with an unbeaten **82**, well supported by Coogan (25) and Brett (32) – a victory to savor.
 - **1985/86** – Parramatta confronted the Campbelltown club in a First grade contest held at Old Kings Oval that became known as '**Mossie's Match**' after the crafty left-arm orthodox spinner **Steve Moss** bamboozled the Ghosts' batsmen claiming match figures of **11/59**. Parramatta kicked-off proceedings with a challenging 292 – built mainly on the efforts of a busy 52 from Kenny Farley, a free-wheeling 46 from veteran Bobby Aitken and a stylish 52 from Kenny Gentles. Campbelltown crumbled in their first dig for a mere 73 – the result of sustained pressure from Moss **5/36**, left-arm speedster Ian Allmey 3/25 and medium-pacer Ian Paton 2/7. Campbelltown's second attempt at the crease proved only marginally better and they were dismissed for 140 – Moss again the agent of destruction snaring **6/23** to spearhead the bumble-bees to an outright win.

- **1997/98** – During a premiership winning season Parramatta's A.W. Green Shield team crushed a hapless Mosman at Old Kings Oval. Parramatta led the way with a massive 319 on a beautiful batting wicket. The innings was dominated by a brilliant display of stroke-making by the gifted **Trent Marsh** who stuck **145**, his efforts were backed by strong efforts from Steve Karam (51) and Peter Halakas (52). Mosman found the Parramatta attack *too hot to handle* and they succumbed for just 109 in their run chase, the off-spinning duo of Alan Langham (4/26) and Tim Lambert (3/20) were the destroyers. Trent Marsh enjoyed a splendid season, he produced the best-ever batting performance by a Parramatta player in A.W. Green Shield amassing **559 runs @ 69.87** in the A.W.G. comp, backed by a century (**105**) in the Bradman Challenge Cup against Central Coast, and he topped his efforts off by captaining Parramatta to win the A.W. Green Shield title and Bradman Challenge Cup double.

- **Fred 'Scotty' Watsford** –

Watsford had a family link dating back to the club's 1843 founding fathers. An unsung hero he would eventually complete a 22-year career as a wicketkeeper with the club.

Fred made his 1st grade debut in 1906/07, direct from the Auburn junior ranks, playing three matches, and over the ensuing three years he played mainly in the 2nd eleven. Eventually becoming the regular 1st grade wicketkeeper in 1910/11. This role remained firmly clenched in his trusty hands until retirement at the close of the 1927/28 season.

In 1912/13, he represented NSW Colts against Victorian Colts, and in the following decade he won a great reputation within the grade community for consistency, smart catching and stumping, and his economy in saving byes.

1921/22 saw him selected to represent NSW against South Australia in the Sheffield Shield competition. But unfortunately, he was unable to gain leave from his employers, and so the opportunity for a State cap eluded him. However, fortunes change and in the same season he played for the NSW 2nd eleven against the Victorian 2nd eleven in Melbourne, scoring 32 runs. The Melbourne Press stated that the standard of his wicket-keeping was a highlight of the game. Normally he featured as a useful tail-end batsman. But between 1922/23 and 1925/26, when 1st grade was short of a reliable opening batsman, Fred answered the call to arms and filled the important role quite creditably. Highlighted by a very sound 1923/24 performance of 472 runs with a top score of 74. Fred died aged 73 years in 1959, a genuine club stalwart. His long vigil behind the stumps in 1st grade yielded **224** victims (106 caught and 118 stumped), his stumping ratio of 52.6% of total dismissals is the highest recorded by a 1st grade wicketkeeper for the club. Over time his output with the bat was **2,208 runs @ 12.13** (best – 74). The club honoured Fred with **Life Membership** as a reward for his efforts and loyalty.

- Due to a shortage of home-grounds in the 1920s – 1st and 2nd grade were given priority in the use of Parramatta Oval – Cumberland's 3rd grade team were nomads and were allocated grounds all over Sydney on which to play their matches. This situation created considerable hardships for the players of the 3rd grade team – especially as few people in those days owned motor vehicles, public transport was limited and getting from the Parramatta region to some of the far flung ovals was quite an adventure on match days – and on many occasions the intrepid Cumbos took the field shorthanded.

This is well illustrated by the final 3rd grade match of the 1923/24 season against Sydney University at Birchgrove Oval No.3. The game would decide which of the combatants would carry the dreaded 'wooden Spoon' tag, and to their credit both teams were '*up for the challenge*' and the game took place with **Cumberland** having only **six** players and University **seven** players. Cumberland ended up winning the game outright by 20 runs.

The scorebook read – **Cumberland 104** (J. Morris 66, S. Cranney 12*) and **76** (Harvey 25, Bolton 17) defeated **Sydney University 119** (Harvey 4/62, Bolton 2/48) and **41** (Howe 3/18, Harvey 1/23).

- A tie with Paddington in **1904/05**. This 1st grade match between two star-packed teams proved to be an exciting contest with the result in doubt right up to the fall of Paddington's final wicket at 318 which equalised Cumberland's total.

Cumberland had first use of the wicket (hours of play being from 2.00 pm to 6.00 pm) and in a somewhat negative approach batted right through Day 1 and continued on to 3.25 pm before declaring at **9/318** on Day 2 (Les Pye 85, Gar Waddy 68, Mudgee Cranney 58 – Pye and Waddy added 101 for the 2nd wicket). This left **Paddington** just 2.75 hours to get the runs. They accepted the challenge and vigorously chased the runs, despite losing champion batsmen Victor Trumper and M.A. Noble cheaply, Test wicketkeeper J.J. Kelly smashed a dashing 95 before being brilliantly caught on the boundary by George Payne to anchor the Paddington run-chase. Finally at 6.10 pm Paddo lost their last wicket at **318** (L. Pye 5/112, W.P. Howell 2/109) to ensure the tie. However, there was a discrepancy in the two score books, with Paddington claiming a 2-run victory. Upon investigation of the scorebooks by the NSWCA the result was verified as a tie. Cumberland's scorer was a youngster George Cranney who was to become a major figure in the club rendering many years of service as a player, senior administrator, and historian.

- Parramatta District Cricket Club possesses a unique record, being the only NSW Premier Cricket club to have played six matches against **English International** touring teams – all these matches were conducted on the Parramatta Oval in the 19th century. An interesting aspect of those old contests was the outstanding success of the club's bowlers, whereas its batsmen only achieved two half-centuries (S.R. Walford 51 and Fred Rice 61), the trundlers starred as follows:
 - 7th/8th December 1881 – Alex Evans **8/27** and **6/35**; Percy Maybury 2/34 and 3/28.
 - 28th/30th November 1884 – Percy Maybury **9/81**.
 - 12th/13th November 1886 – John Cleeve **7/20** and 2/14; Harry Thorpe 2/27 and 3/30.
 - 4th/5th November 1887 – John Cleeve 4/71.
 - 2nd/3rd December 1887 – Harry Thorpe **7/41**.
 - 9th/10th December 1891 – Harry Thorpe **5/44**; J.C. Wilson also bowled Dr W.G. Grace for 0 in this match.

Obituary – Ronald ‘Ron’ Wright (O.A.M.)

On Tuesday 27th July 2021 the Parramatta District Cricket Club members were stunned by the sudden death of **Ron Wright** the Club’s Iconic Secretary at the age of 89 years. Ron who had been battling worrying health issues over recent years, but never let them interfere with his determination to ‘*get on with the job*’, was dressed and ready to venture into the office of his own surgical supply business for yet another day’s work, when he became ill and was rushed to Westmead Hospital where he sadly passed away.

Originating from Kent, England Ron Wright has been a monumental figure as an administrator for the Parramatta District Cricket Club, his unrelenting ‘*off the field*’ efforts and devotion ‘*to the cause*’ are legendary within both the Parramatta club circles and the Sydney Premier Cricket community and place him in the forefront of the parade of splendid officials who have administered Parramatta over its long-lasting history.



An amiable and kind-hearted gentleman, he performed the ever-increasing duties of Honorary Secretary for **40** years, a club record for any official in a key administrative office. The timeframe of Ron’s reign covers the seasons – **1979/80** to **2020/21***– 1987/88 being the only season he wasn’t elected Secretary. Ron commenced his association with the Parramatta club in 1978/79 as Assistant Secretary - serving his apprenticeship prior to taking on the main role.

The term “*Mr. Parramatta Cricket*” applied well to Ron because there have been periods – especially in the late 1980’s and early 1990’s - when the club basically owed its continued existence to his energy, commitment, and generosity. As proprietor of a Surgical Supply Company, Ron often used its resources to underpin the financial fortunes of the cricket club and continued to utilize them to facilitate the club’s admin and Cricket NSW compliance workloads.

What was amazing about Ron and his passion for the Parramatta District Cricket Club is that he was never a cricketer, in his younger days in England he was a very keen Soccer goalkeeper, and it was only an involvement with his son's junior cricket team that brought him to the game. Fortunately for Parramatta former first-grade captain Ross Shepherd was coach of that junior team and he recognised Ron's potential as an administrator and lured him to the grade club.

Throughout the multitude of years of service that Ron gave to the club he demonstrated an amazing stamina and zeal for all aspects of the job. He rarely missed a Parramatta management meeting, attended all SCA delegates meetings, frequently attended local Junior Club presentations, he also attended affiliated club meetings (e.g. Auburn Shires), was a key member of various fund-raising committees (e.g. Sporting Luncheons, the Doug Walters Golf Classic), was ever-present on match days at Old Kings Oval and manned the canteen if needed, was always one of the first persons to arrive at mid-week practices, met with the Parramatta and Merrylands Park Trusts to cover issues with Old Kings and Merrylands Ovals, and maintained intra-club communications (e.g. Website).

Ron was genuinely well-liked and appreciated by the members of the club, and the local wider cricket community, and his concern for the players' welfare saw him provide valuable assistance and support to many needy individuals over his time as Secretary. To many of us he was an inspiration, who wouldn't be inspired by a man of his advanced years '*still rolling up his sleeves*' and '*ploughing into the tasks*' of running his own company on a day-to-day basis and carrying out the operational duties of a NSW Premier Cricket Club Secretary.

His outstanding service to the Parramatta District Cricket Club has been recognised and honoured by the receipt of the following prestigious awards:

Obituary – Ian Gibbs

Sadly the ranks of the ‘Two-Blue’ bumble-bee clad army has thinned with the passing of ex Cumberland 1st Grade batsman Ian Gibbs during the past few days. He was a dogged fighter with bat in hand in his playing days, and he fought long and hard for a number of years trying to overcome cancer.

“Gibbsie” came down from his native Queensland as an 18-year-old, on a Bank job transfer and joined Cumberland in **1971/72**. He made a favourable early impression with a century in 4th grade and by mid-season was a 2nd grade regular.

Generally occupying a top 3 spot in the batting order the robust right-hander owned a solid range of strokes. He batted with fortitude and placed a great value on his wicket. A gritty competitor and team player, he made his **1st grade debut** in **1974/75** and until 1983/84 he spent almost equal time jumping between 1st and 2nd grade.

Ian played key roles in the ‘back-to-back’ 3rd grade premierships in 1972/73 and 1973/74, sharing a **1st wicket partnership of 188** with Bob Stevens against Manly in the 1973/74 **Final**. In all he scored 5 centuries for the club (1st – 1, 2nd – 1, 3rds – 2, 4ths – 1).

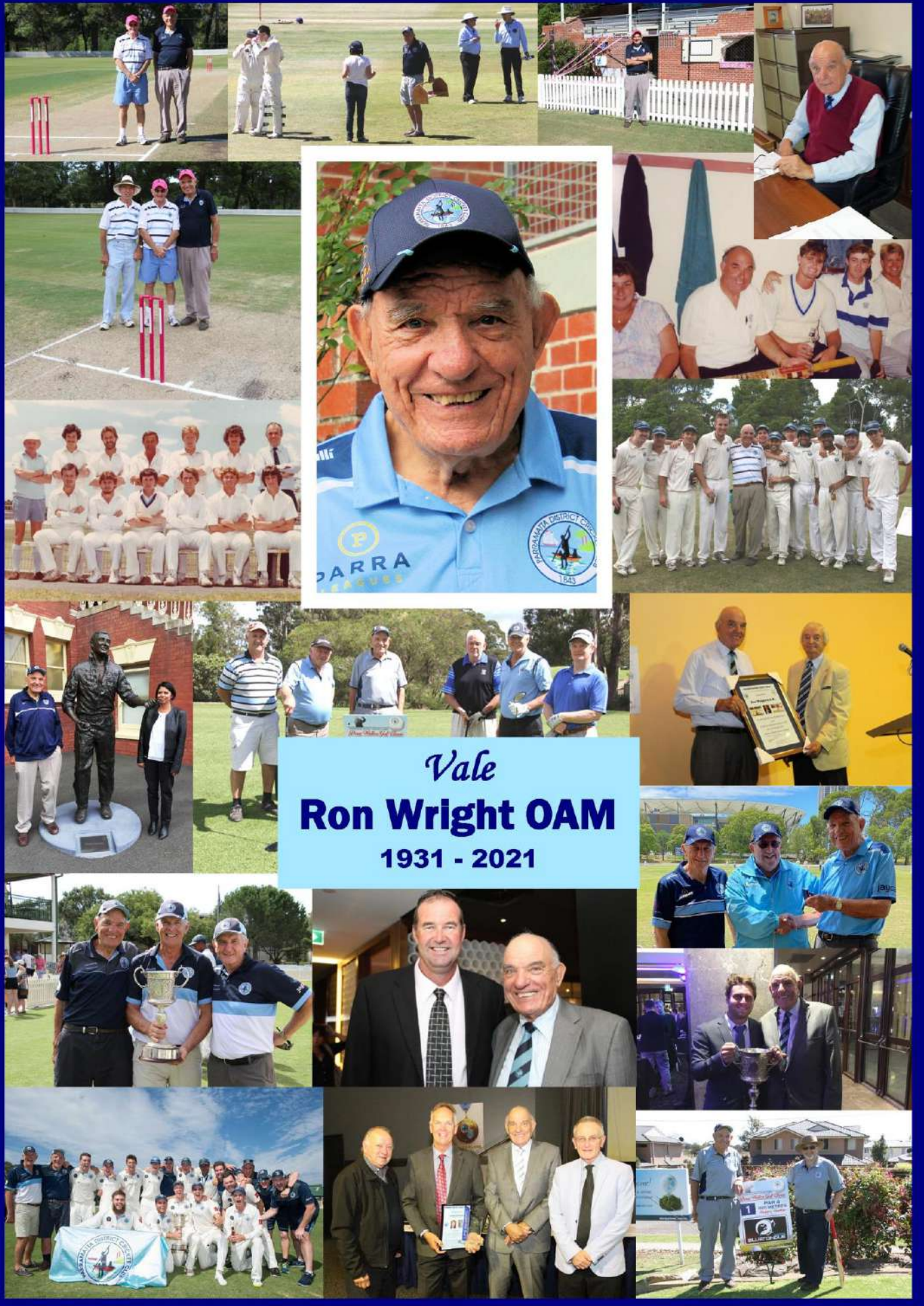
His most productive season with the willow for the club was 1974/75 when he compiled 564 runs @ 26.86 (1sts – 363, 2nds – 201).

He was a popular and well-regarded personality during his playing career with the club. Early on in his stint with Cumberland teammate Mike Wood introduced him to a lovely young woman Lillian who became his future life partner and wife.

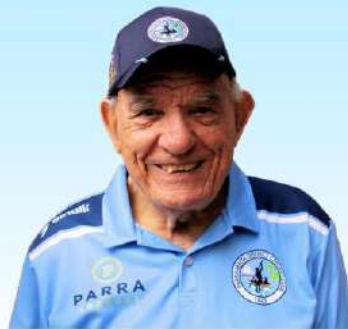

Australian cricket legend Doug Walters gets an Order of Australia in Queen's Birthday Honours

Parramatta cricket is synonymous with Richie Benaud but a loyal Test legend who refused to leave the area so he could remain at the club of his youth has been made an Australia Medal recipient.

When Australian cricketer Doug Walters moved from Dungog to Sydney as a fresh-faced 17-year-old in 1963 he joined the Central Cumberland District Cricket Club and has remained one of its most loyal members.

Walters' elite talents as an Australian batsman and part-time bowler took him overseas and saw him made a member of the Order of Australia for the Queen's Birthday Honours.

He was an Australian Test team member from 1965 to 1981 when he played 74 Tests and played 28 One Day internationals, achievements which saw him being inducted into the Cricket Hall of Fame member in 2011.

His passion translated to penning books including *Doug Walters Looking for Runs* in 1971 and top seller *One for the Road* in 1988.

For all his international success, all roads led back to North Rocks, so he would be a stone's throw from the club he joined on the cusp of becoming an Australian cricketer.

The club became known as Parramatta and District Cricket Club when he retired in 1982.

Rules dictated that players had to live within the residential location of the club and Walters refused to budge so he could continue being part of the heart and soul of the organisation, where he has coached players and is a life member.

“I had some good times playing for Parramatta and enjoyed it all,” he said.

The 76-year-old grew up in Dungog and debuted his Test career with 150 against England in December 1965. His brother and sister supported Australia so he grew up backing England and the West Indies to inject some rivalry into the household.

He sometimes competed against players he idolised such as Sir Garfield Sobers and Wes Hall.

“As a kid I was more a bowler than a batsman,” he said.

“All my success as a youngster was with a ball. In my second Sheffield Shield game I got none from 128 so I thought I better convert with my batting capers.”

He welcomed his Queen’s birthday honour as “terrific” but he is no stranger to such accolades — he was awarded a member of the British Empire in Queen’s Birthday Honours List in 1975, for services to cricket.

He was inducted into the Sport Australia Hall of Fame in 1994.

He named friendships as the highlight of his cricket career, many which he forged back when he would endlessly puff on cigarettes and players had to have a second income.

“We were paid but we all had to have jobs,” the father of four recalled.

“We couldn’t afford to live on how much we were paid as a cricketer. When I first started we were on about two pounds a day when I started playing Sheffield Shield.”

A chain smoker, Walters supplemented his income as a salesman with Rothmans cigarette company. He probably puffed on 50 ciggies if he “slept in and went to bed early”.

He kicked the habit 13 years ago but his love of cricket remains strong.

He is also confident of his beloved Parramatta and District Cricket Club’s future and is a regular talent scout there.

“We’ve got heaps of talent in the area,” he said.

“Trying to keep them in the area might be a problem. When I started you had to live in the area.”

DOUG WALTERS AM: ONE OF A KIND

Kevin Doug Walters, one of Australia's iconic and much-loved cricketers, was awarded a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in the 2022 Queen's Birthday Honours List for significant service to cricket at an elite level. This adds to his MBE awarded in 1975, Centenary Medal in 2003, and an inductee into Sport Australia Hall of Fame in 1994.

The North Rocks local took the award with his customary humour, telling *the Hills to Hawkesbury Community News*: "I was very surprised as I thought I was over the age for these sorts of things!"

Doug, 76, is one of the finest – and most popular – cricketers produced by Australia, playing 74 Tests, having made his debut in 1965 Ashes series against England. He became the ninth Australian to score a century on debut, making 155 and was later compared to the great Sir Donald Bradman. He famously reached a century in a session against England by smacking Bob Willis for a six off the last ball of the day in the 1974/75 series.

Known for his larrikin ways, smoking and beers, Doug captivated millions of fans around the world with his breathtaking batting, amassing 5357 runs at an average of 48.26. He also took 49

Test wickets with his medium pace, and was known for his golden arm as he managed to break up big partnerships.

During his amazing first-class career, Doug played 258 matches, scoring more than 16,000 runs at an average of 43.84.

He was also one of the most laidback but highly-gifted cricketers able to play at the highest level without losing his sense of timing and laconic humour. “I don’t think I would have enjoyed night cricket because it would have cut into my drinking time!” Doug said with a laugh. Incidentally, Doug said he stopped smoking – he was said to have more than 50 cigarettes a day – 13 years ago, using laser treatment.

Reflecting back at a glittering career which included 28 one-day internationals (ODIs), Doug said he had been playing cricket ever since he was old enough to lift a bat. “My parents (Ted and May), my brothers Warren, Terry and sister Colleen all loved sports,” Doug said. “If I had not played cricket as a career, I really don’t know what I would have done or played.” (Sadly, Warren passed away a few days ago while Terry died in an accident earlier).

Doug was a loyal stalwart of Parramatta DCC, playing 17 seasons starting from 1963, and has a pavilion named after him. Sydney Cricket Ground also honoured him with a stand, later demolished. He even has a bar named after him in the Victor Trumper Stand.

Doug said that legendary Australian paceman Jeff Thompson was the quickest he has seen to this day. “Yes, Jeff was the fastest I have faced,” Doug said. “Sir Gary Sobers was the best batsman I have seen, and like all great batsmen including Viv Richards, he made good bowlers seem ordinary. Sobers was very gifted and the best all-rounder. He was the best cricketer, full stop.”

Reminded that he was also considered a part of the cricketing elite, Doug laughed: “I am way down that list! I had my days, but they (Sobers, Richards) had more days than me!”

Doug underwent National Services Training from 1966-67 but said it never affected his cricketing career. “Not really, as I had my best ever series soon after I came back, against the West Indies in 1968,” he said. In that 1968/69 series, Doug plundered 699 runs from four Tests (he missed the opening game due to an injury), **becoming the first in history to score a century and a double century in one Test.**

A life member of Cricket NSW and Parramatta DCC, where he is one of their most famous and much-loved members, Doug noted good players always adapt to different formats, saying David Warner is a great example. “Warner started as a slogger in T20s, then moved to ODIs before playing Test cricket, quite the reverse to other players,” Doug explained.

When asked if he would consider being a national selector, Doug chuckled: “I have never wanted to be a selector or an umpire!”

Doug, who is married to Caroline, has four children, Brynley, Lynton, Hannah and Mitchell, and is delighted, “they are all very keen on sports”. “My daughter still plays soccer. However, Mitchell, who was the most talented cricketer out of the lot, wasted his talents,” he said.

Doug keeps fit by playing golf and has written two books, *One for the Road*, and *The Entertainers* with fellow Australian cricket star Mark Waugh.

First Grade Report

The Parramatta First grade side had a different season in 2021/2022 to that of previous seasons as we had a few fresh faces in the line-up. With Covid reeking havoc in the pre-season it was a different build up for the team and the club.

In Round 13 we headed out to Bensons Lane for our first 2day match of the season. In another rain affected game and another lost toss we had the toughest of the conditions and struggled early. We grouped through Coop and Dhruv who both posted half centuries. With only 50 overs to get a result all the bowlers toiled hard and if some decisions went our way, we would have had one of our great wins. It ended in a draw which saw us in a tough position to make the finals.

Round 14 saw us take on our local rivals Blacktown at Old Kings. Now what happened on this afternoon was simply ridiculous. Luke Dempsey went nuts and hit 13 sixes on his way to a record breaking 41 ball hundred. It was incredible scenes and ticket showed what he can produce when he's switched on. We won the game by 6 wickets and claimed a bonus point in a huge win.

T20 Competition

Our T20 campaign started with a trip to Rosedale to take on Fairfield. With a superb bowling performance from our spinners we restricted the Lions to 125. On a tough wicket we managed to chase it down with 5 wickets in hand and gave us the perfect start to the competition.

After a complete washout of round 2 we headed out for a clash with Bankstown in round 3. After another great bowling performance, we were chasing a very gettable 127. 57* from Bert and 43 from Coop guided us home with ease winning by 7 wickets and saw us top of the ladder in the West.

Round 5 saw us play our rivals in Penrith. With a few x panthers in our line-up this was a big game. Again, our spin attack was superb on a tiny ground, and we restricted Penrith to 172. In reply we were always in control and did it easy with Bert top scoring with 83 off 50 balls which saw us get home by 7 wickets with an over to spare.

This was a disappointing end to what we thought was another great campaign which saw us fall a game short. I believe that we are really close to winning this comp and with some luck we will be holding the Kingsgrove Trophy in the next few seasons.

Notes:

The Belvidere Cup was donated to the NSW Cricket Association by former Australian representative, Dr Percy Charlton. The silver cup was known as the New South Wales Cricket Association Championship Cup and was won by the Belvidere Cricket Club in 1882. In 1931, surviving members of the Club, through Dr Charlton, expressed the wish that the cup should be accepted by the Association for perpetual competition connected with Grade Competitions, and at its meeting in March of that year, the Association resolved that the cup would be competed for by the First Grade teams with the condition that it should not pass from the Association's keeping. The initial First Grade Premiership was contested in 1893/94, and was won by East Sydney.

Second Grade Report 2021/2022








THIRD GRADE REPORT

Final Position: 6th Season 2021/22

After a very unusual season with differing start dates and tight covid restrictions in 2020/21 there was a sense of optimism that the following season would be back to normal. Unfortunately it wasn't to be and the start of the 2021/22 season was pushed back while covid lockdowns remained in place. Round One for Grades 1 & 2 began on the 6th November, and Lower Grades (3s to 5s) started the following week, the 13th November, with Round 1 being a bye.

Season 2021/22 saw a changing of the guard with Jason Coleman handing over the full-time captaincy after 7 consecutive seasons. Michael Ho captained the side for the first 6 rounds, Jason Coleman captained in Rounds 7 & 13 and I led the side in all other Rounds. This year saw a total of 25 players walk onto the field to represent our great club in the 3rd Grade competition, 2 more than the previous season.

Playing a total of 15 matches for the year, 3rd grade won 7, lost 5 and drew 4 matches for the season and finished in 6th place qualifying for finals. Unfortunately we were beaten in the quarter final by the eventual premiers Northern District.

The season started off pretty poorly with 3 losses in the first 5 rounds (including a washout against Bankstown and the Round 1 bye). Despite some positive performances, especially with the bat, the group was still finding its feet and just not quite doing enough to get the results in what were relatively close losses against Mosman, Gordon and Northern District.

Round 6 was the game which I believe really turned the poor start around and kick-started the season. It was one of the most incredible games I have ever played in. We lost the toss at Merrylands Oval against Eastern Suburbs and were sent in to bat. We started poorly on a tough wicket, falling to 7/101 before a brilliant counter-attacking innings from Blair Overton (73* off 62) got us to a competitive total of 9/194 off 50 overs. Easts then got off to a brilliant start and were cruising at 1/142 with 7 of our bowlers chipping away with no reward. Enter Michael Ho. Incredibly, Hoey completely turned the game on its head taking 8/40 in 8.4 overs to secure an unbelievable win, bowling Easts out for 186 in the 45th over.

The next 2 rounds saw the group really start to click, with back to back winning run chases. Firstly against Fairfield-Liverpool chasing 208 on a very hot day at Fairfield Oval, and then a convincing 8 wicket win against UNSW at home.

A convincing win against Randwick-Petersham at Petersham Oval in Round 9 was unfortunately then followed up by a frustrating loss against Western Suburbs at home in Round 10. We unfortunately fell victim to some periods of slow scoring during the run chase and eventually fell 20 runs short of the required total with 4 wickets in hand.

A convincing win against Sydney in Round 11 was then followed up by back to back nail biting wins. Firstly against Manly-Warringah in Round 12 which went right down to the very last over with Austin Philip eventually clearing the infield to secure the winning runs in a very hard fought game. This was then followed up by a fantastic chasing victory against Hawkesbury in a game heavily affected by rain.

Unfortunately we then had probably our worst performance of the season in Round 13 against Blacktown at Merrylands Oval which meant all results were absolutely crucial heading into the last 3 rounds.

Adding another twist to a rollercoaster season, our final 3 fixtures were all washed out meaning our Finals hopes rested on other results during the final round of the season. Fortunately, results went our way (thank you to the weather Gods for a timely Coogee storm...) and we managed to finish in 6th place and secure a Quarter Final matchup against reigning premiers Northern District.

With so much rain falling across Sydney during the month prior, the game was scheduled to be played at Pratten Park, a neutral ground, on Saturday 19th March. In keeping with the theme of season 2021/22, a huge downpour of rain the night before meant no play was possible on the Saturday, but with the help of all players from both teams the ground was fit for play the following day.

After a month without cricket, the group put in a very good effort with the ball and in the field after winning the toss and fielding, restricting Northern District to just 213. However, a valiant effort with the bat wasn't enough against a classy outfit and we fell all out for just 170.

It was a pleasure to captain this group of young players this season. I feel as though we became a really tight-knit group during the season and this was a big factor in why we were able to put in some really strong, tough performances often in trying circumstances. It speaks volumes that after a poor start we were able to string a number of wins together and eventually play Finals. I'd like to thank Jason Coleman, Paul Sullivan, and everyone at the club for the opportunity to captain the 3rd grade team this season. I thoroughly enjoyed the challenge and hope to be given the opportunity again in the future.

Special thank you to the following people:

- Our many number of scorers this year - it is always greatly appreciated.
- Laken and all the Merrylands Oval Ground Staff for providing us with such a quality playing surface in such trying circumstances. All other opposing clubs and umpires always comment positively about the square and outfield.

Thanks for all your effort boys. This was honestly one of the most enjoyable seasons of cricket I have played in. I believe this group is just getting started and can really achieve some great things. Hope to see you all back next season!



Fourth Grade Report

The fourth grade playing group:

Showed plenty of patience and is still learning the craft. Will keep getting better with more experience up the top. A very good fielder who moves well in the outfield with a safe pair of hands.

Oliver Sheekey – calm and collected is the best way to describe Sheeks. He showed a lot of maturity with bat and ball. Had a huge innings of 90 against East's that was the big contributor to that win. Squeezed the opposition with the ball on a weekly basis taking a few wickets, drying up the run rate and getting through his overs quick. Kashvi Gunawardane – our leading run scorer in 4s. 315 runs @35 led the way with the bat from the top. Thank you to Jason, Sully and the club who backed me to captain the team. It was a challenge for me and something outside of my comfort zone but helped me grow as a player and a person. Moving the pieces on the chess board was a craft that I found a lot of joy from and I consider myself extremely lucky to have such a talented bunch of players in the team to make my job a lot easier. It was a pleasure and a privilege to lead the team and I know the club is in safe hands with the amount of quality of this young side in 4s.





2020/21 AW Green Shield Report



Let me begin by taking a moment to acknowledge the loss of a true giant of the Parramatta District and New South Wales Cricket fraternity with the loss of Mr Ron Wright. Mr Wright was the Parramatta District Cricket Club Secretary when I joined the then known, Cumberland District Cricket Club during the early 1980's and was the current Club Secretary of the PDCC until his passing in 2021, devoting tireless hours to the betterment of playing cricket, Mr Wright was a true state's man in all aspects.

As the Parramatta Women's Grade Cricket Club approaches its first decade participating in the Cricket NSW Sydney Women's Cricket Association, the club is evolving as a true grade cricket club with its structure.

The 2021 / 2022 season was truly a turbulent season, dealing with a delayed start due to Covid, which required almost daily changes to how, what and when cricket could return to somewhat normality, an extortionary effort by CNSW and the Clubs Executive, with special mention to Debbie Pooley who calmly joined the dots, and circulated the policies throughout the club, outlining the club officials, player and parent responsibilities, in a format that ensured the responsibilities were adhered to, which provided a safe environment for all.

Preseason training was organised by Mohan, via "Zoom" challenges were set, and players responded, which reflected the commitment and character of players and officials, this allowed the club to be in the best possible position to enter the 2021 / 2022 season with the best possible skill set under the circumstances and challenges that the club and players had to face.

Each season our club reaches new milestones, this season was no different, with the introduction of the Third Grade side that under the guidance of "Coach" Jonathan "Jono" Hurst and Rachel Sutton ©, this team exceeded, and exceeded all expectations, there is no doubt that this team would have played semi final cricket, if not for the intervention of the weather that plagued the back half of the season.

The Second Grade team also under the guidance of Coach "Jono" secured the Premiership for the third time in nine seasons and 5 final appearances from 3rd position, which is a feat within itself. However, even more remarkable when you consider this team did not have the same 11 players in any consecutive week due to the support required for 1st, 3rd and Brewers week in and week out. This was highlighted the team's spirit in their round 9 match V St George. Having the opposition in the sheds for 102, defending 109, in my humble opinion was one of the highlights of the season. First time captain Rachel Sutton was also voted as the 2nd best skipper of the season by the umpires, which is a credit to her.

Our First Grade squad "oozes" talent, which can be summed up in round 12 whilst missing key players V a competition front runner Manly, at Manly Oval, taking the points by 8 wickets and 26 overs, our 8th position finish does not do this team justice and 2022/2023 will be a season to be part of. Sophie Vaughan was also voted 2nd best captain for the season of 1st Grade, which is a great tribute to Sophie's season.

The Brewers were in "that" galvanising season, and to be truthful "lost" matches rather than the opposition winning them, a wealth of talent that will be on display during the 2022/2023 season. Lucy Wilson requires an additional mention being awarded Brewers captain of the season along with the "Bob Curtin Award" voted on by the umpires over all grades by a margin of points doubled the closest rival out of 261 players. Lucy has also been awarded the Brewers player of 2021/2022, Parramatta Player of the season and the Parramatta Medal recipient, and I am sure she will feature during the 2022/2023 season.

Although we did not top the table in the Club Championship, we averaged the highest average in the "Spirit of Cricket" "coming 2nd overall, which reflects all players both on and off the field, which should be noted and acknowledged, this in my opinion reflects what the outside sees within.

A number of players have achieved personal goals during the season, along with a number of our players populating CNSW Academies, Metropolitan, Country Representative and State Sides.

Special mention to Claire Moore being contracted by the Sydney Sixes and NSW Breakers teams, and Hayley Silver-Holmes missing the WBBL season due to injuries but featuring in the Tasmanian WNCL title winning side.

This season's new uniform incorporated the local indigenous "Dharug" artwork and has generated interest and awareness both inside and outside of the club of our First Nations People. Indigenous round was hosted by our Second Grade Team at Old Kings Oval, a barefoot circle and the new Indigenous artwork on the match stumps made the day meaningful and respectful of those who first walked on this land. Days like this and the continued support of our two charities highlight the club's efforts to ensure inclusiveness, awareness, and community responsibility, this is a differential between your club and other clubs.

Our Parramatta District Cricket Association development programme keeps going from strength to strength, with all players being challenged. Acknowledgement and congratulations to the under 14's, being undefeated Minor Premiers and worthy Premierships winners, securing another shield in the male dominated domain.

The club will continue to work towards functioning as a traditional grade club with a structured selection process and selection panel. We appreciate that at times this can be confusing and possibly uncomfortable for some players and parents, please be re-assured, it is the club's policy to always provide the best opportunities for players to play the best cricket they can play. The club considers the best interests of each and every player that is selected along with the required balance of the teams and endeavours to get it right.

The new Ritchie Benaud Oval Project will secure the club new state of the art facilities that have been the missing link in the club's portfolio and will only amplify the level of professionalism that the PWGCC have embraced within its culture.

Thank you to all those who lend a hand during the season each thing you do is important and again is another differential that differs us to other clubs, naturally our coaches and managers who deal with various personalities.

Needless to say, the gratitude to Mohan and Debbie that make up the Club's Executive, that get the job done and I must say do it well, thank you both.
